There have been many improvements around town. The Conservation Commission has removed many of the invasive species from the Coe Hill property, clearing the way for increased passive recreation and further development of a Stewardship Plan. At Peckham Park, there is a new basketball court and Pete Cabelus has done an excellent job in creating an expanded picnic area in the shady grove behind Ed Bailey's memorial. At the Community Center, Public Works has installed a new above ground oil tank feeding the new (2-year-old) boiler and have repaired and resurfaced many more of our town roads.



BUILDING OFFICIAL

Robert Boender

Robert A. Boender has been hired as Middlefield's Building



Official. In his role, Rob will be responsible for verifying the safe construction for occupancy of structures and for the protection of investments in real property by assuring structures meet or exceed building code requirements and related standards. This is accomplished by the research and application of state building code in force and effect within the Town. Compliance is achieved through the permit review process, inspections, and enforcement of the building code, the review of applications and associated site, structural and other required construction plans.

Rob, a Connecticut Certified Building Official and Electrical Inspector, has worked in those roles in both New Haven and Stamford CT. He is a licensed master electrician in six states, with experience in evaluating construction projects from residential to very large commercial installations. Rob also teaches building and electrical code compliance on-line and in several national geographies. Robert is of Dutch descent and loves traveling with his wife Jill, visiting the Netherlands and the rest of Europe as much as possible!

Steve brings firsthand knowledge of veterans' programs -he used the GI Bill to complete his BS in Finance at Central Connecticut State University and MBA at Arizona State University, and the VA Home Loan Program to purchase his home. He and his wife Donna live in the Harvest Woods section of town.

- You will be out of town during all voting hours on Election Day.
- Illness prevents you from voting in person.
- Religious beliefs prevent you from voting in person.
- You are performing duties as an election official at a location other than your own.
- You have a physical disability that prevents you from voting in person.

Assessor's Office

PERSONAL PROPERTY DECLARATIONS

Notice is hereby given to all owners of taxable personal property in the Town of Middlefield that they must file their personal property declaration in the Assessor's Office on or **before November 3, 2025**, in accordance with CGS Section 12-41.

Also due on or **before November 3, 2025** are applications for the exemption of Newly Acquired Manufacturing Machinery and Equipment and of certain Commercial Trucks in excess of 26,000-lbs gross weight used exclusively for the transportation of freight for hire and trucks over 55,000-lbs.

The personal property declaration shall include, but is not limited to, all furniture, fixtures, tools, machinery and equipment of commercial and industrial businesses, as well as unregistered motor vehicles, horses and farm machinery owned by them on the 1st day of October. **Failure to declare results in a 25% assessment penalty.**

Declarations will be mailed to all known owners of Personal Property located in the Town of Middlefield and Village of Rockfall. Declaration forms, exemption applications and assistance in filing these forms will be available at the Middlefield Assessor's Office and the Town of Middlefield website on October 1st.

As of **October 1, 2025**, all delinquent tax bills will be turned over to Taxserv. All delinquent bills given to Taxserv will be assessed an additional 15% charge for collection. 

DRUG TAKE BACK DAY

The Resident State Trooper's Office is participating in **Drug Take Back Day** - a biannual DEA-led event where you can safely and anonymously dispose of unused or expired prescription medications in partnership with local law enforcement and community organizations.

Prescription medications will only be accepted during the DEA Drug Take Back Program events on **Saturday, October 25, 2025** and **Saturday, April 26, 2026**.

Please do not leave medications unattended at this location or deposit them at the front door without notifying the Connecticut State Police. This office connects to the Community Center Theater, which hosts many groups and events, some of which may include children. The unauthorized disposal of medications poses a significant safety risk.

After more than 30 years of diligent upkeep, we're looking forward to these improvements that will make our facility even better.

Public Works

ROAD WORK IMPROVEMENTS SEASON WRAPS UP

Our Public Works crew has been hard at work this spring and summer on road work improvements. They have successfully repaired and / or chip sealed about 5 miles of Middlefield town roads. Over the past two years, they've made great strides in improving our roadways:

- One-third of Middlefield's roads - about 12 out of 35 miles - have been repaired or chip sealed over the last 2 years.
- The Beseck Lake resurfacing project was completed this spring.
- Over the summer, the team laid 500 tons of asphalt to prepare for 36,000 square yards of chip sealing.
- In June and July, another 600 tons of asphalt was laid, paving the way for an additional 43,000 square yards of chip sealing.
- Widened the Community Center parking lot entrance to allow for 2-way traffic in advance of the traffic pattern change when construction begins on the Public Safety Facility.

COMMUNITY CENTER HEATING OIL TANK REPLACEMENT



We are finishing up the installation of the new 2,000 gallon above ground heating oil tank for the Community Center. This project required the removal

of an underground 8,000-gallon tank that had reached its end of life. Cahill Excavating was used for the tank removal and disposal. Town employees acted as a general contractor for this project, resulting in over **\$25,000 in cost savings**.



LAKE SHORE DRIVE FENCE REBUILT

The fence for the Lake Shore Drive culvert has been repaired to like new condition after an accident earlier this year destroyed a large portion of it. Rockland Fence of Middlefield performed this work for us.

Conservation Commission HUNTING SEASON REMINDERS & RECREATION BEST PRACTICES

Fall hunting seasons are approaching:

- **Sept. 1st** - Small game
- **Sept. 15th – Dec. 31st** – Archery & Deer
- **Oct. 4th – Oct 31st** - Turkey firearms
- **Nov. 19th - Dec. 9th** - Deer firearms

Peak activity is early mornings and late afternoons. To stay safe, the Commission and CT DEEP recommend:

- **Wear blaze orange** or other **high-visibility clothing**
- **Use a bell** (also great for dogs and horses)
- **Call out to hunters** if you see one

COE HILL OPEN SPACE RESTORATION PROJECT

This spring, the Conservation Commission cleared invasive scrub brush at Coe Hill Open Space, opening up previously inaccessible areas for easier foot access. To guide future care, Connwood Foresters has been hired to access the property and draft a stewardship plan, expected by the end of October.

Community input is encouraged as we set management goals, and volunteers will soon be needed for projects like clearing paths and removing invasive vines. Residents interested in helping or sharing suggestions are invited to contact the Commission directly @ Bdumas@middlefieldct.org

COGINCHAUG GREENWAY PROPERTY

The Commission is considering hunting permits for the Coginchaug Greenway. This could expand recreation, improve access to the State Wildlife Management Area, and help keep the habitat healthy by managing deer populations and protecting native plants. Questions or comments? WPCA - STEAP GRANT FOR WASTEWATER INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENTS UPDATE

The Water Pollution Control Authority (WPCA) continues to make progress on critical wastewater infrastructure improvements funded through the Small-Town Economic Assistance Program (STEAP) Grant.

As part of the first phase, the WPCA's consulting engineering firm, Nathan L. Jacobson and Associates prepared plans, specifications and bid documents for improvements to the Brookside Drive Pump Station. This station, in operation for approximately 47 years, pumps wastewater from the Brookside Drive Sewer District (Zygo) to the City of Middletown's sewer system. Following the bidding process, Tucker Mechanical submitted the lowest base bid at \$326,000.

The second phase of the STEAP Grant will focus primarily on improvements to the Mattabeseck Road Pump Station, which serves the Lake Beseck Sewer District.

Beseck Lake Environmental Committee

The Environment Committee continues to review lake water quality data. All Habitat, our lake management team, has completed three monthly tests measuring total phosphorus and Chlorophyll a (an indicator of algae growth). July showed the highest readings, especially near the north inflow pipes. Sampling is done monthly at six sites around the lake.

Some cyanobacteria can produce toxins harmful to people and animals. To monitor this, Western CT State University tests weekly for Microcystin at the Town Beach. So far, all readings remain well within safe limits, with weekly reports sent to the Town and Committee.

In June, the CT Agricultural Experiment Station completed its aquatic plant survey. While concerns about invasive Curly-Leaf Pondweed proved unfounded, Vasey's Pondweed—a state-protected native species - has expanded significantly over the past three years. Large dense patches, especially along the western shore, have become a nuisance. As one lake manager noted, "just because plants are native doesn't mean they're always beneficial." This plant naturally dies back in late summer after its reproductive cycle.

Lake Drawdown NOTICE

The Beseck Lake drawdown will begin on or near **October 1**, with a target drawdown of **6 feet by November 1**. This level will be maintained through **January 31, 2026**.

Starting **February 1**, the lake level will be managed at approximately **3 feet drawdown until March 1, 2026**, after which it will be allowed to refill naturally in preparation for the spring recreational season. Actual water levels may vary due to weather and other uncontrollable factors.

If you plan to use the **State boat ramp** to remove your vessel, please plan ahead and don't wait — delaying could leave your **boat stuck or stranded**.

Homecoming Celebration & Veterans Recognition Ceremony

for Vietnam Era Veterans of Middlefield, Connecticut



On August 26, 2025, Middlefield's Vietnam Era Veterans and their families were welcomed to a moving **Homecoming Celebration and Veterans Recognition Ceremony** at the Lyman Orchards Golf Tent. This event, hosted by state and town leaders, was filled with reflection, gratitude, and heartfelt recognition. The ceremony opened with The **Posting of the Colors** by the Middlefield Volunteer Fire Company Color Guard, followed by a stirring rendition of the **National Anthem** performed by 8th grader **Lily Cate Waterman**.

Attendees then stood together for the **Pledge of Allegiance**, honoring both country and community. First Selectman Robert Yamartino welcomed all in attendance and shared: *"The end of the Vietnam war was a ½ century ago and the welcome you received coming home was very different from those who served in other wars throughout our history. Bob Bascilicato, one of my close friends and a fellow Middlefield resident served in Vietnam. Upon his arrival at LAX, he was ordered to help quell the Watts riots and ordered "If anyone crosses that intersection, you are to shoot to kill." After the officer the magazine, cleared the chamber, and pocketed the ammo. He told me he would not shoot an American. Like you, Bob served his country in a time of great upheaval and change, disagreement and animosity. Like you, he served heroically, and honorably. And like many of you, he settled in Middlefield, raised his family, and despite his poor reception, continued to serve his community. As I look at you sitting here,*

I recognize many of you who continue to serve our community in so many ways; helping light a Christmas Tree, opening restaurants and businesses in town, volunteering on the Fire Company, the library, DMIAAB, Park and Rec, P&Z, working with veterans and in so many other ways.

So therefore, please accept my very heartfelt "Thank you for all the service you have and continue to provide us". Welcome home!"

Bob then gave a touching **Memoriam for John "Jack" Malcolm**, featuring **Ken Hamilton** on trumpet performing **TAPS**. A memorial plaque will be placed at the **Middlefield Community Center** beneath the oak tree in memory of **Jack**, honoring his service and his place in the heart of our town.

In Memory of **Sgt. John "Jack" Malcolm**

This oak tree is dedicated to the enduring legacy of Sgt. John "Jack" Malcolm, a son of Middlefield who gave his life in service to his country during the Vietnam War.

May its roots honor his courage, its branches carry his memory, and its shade offer peace to all who remember.

Born April 24, 1950 – Killed in Action August 25, 1970

Dignitaries then shared remarks that spoke to sacrifice, resilience, and the importance of recognition, including Lt. Governor **Susan Bysiewicz**, Connecticut Veterans Affairs Commissioner **Ron Welch**, **William Currin**, Manager of Veterans Advocacy and Assistance with CT Veterans Affairs **John Carragher**, and State Senator **Jan Hochadel**.

Lt. Governor Bysiewicz's words resonated deeply with all in attendance: *"As Lt. Governor, it has been my privilege to host ceremonies honoring Vietnam-era veterans across our state, and I am especially proud to be hosting a ceremony in Middlefield. When the troops returned home from Vietnam, they did not receive the welcome home that was deserved. Quite the opposite. They were met with harsh judgment, despite answering the call to honorably serve their country,"* said Lt. Governor Susan Bysiewicz. *"Each time I meet a Vietnam veteran, I am struck by their sacrifice, grit, and all that they endured without so much as a complaint."*

I hope that by taking a moment to honor our Vietnam Veterans, we are able to convey even just a small amount of how grateful we are for them and their service."

Lieutenant Governor Bysiewicz then moved through the audience with a microphone, giving several veterans the chance to share their stories and reflect on their experiences.



Each veteran received a lapel pin and certificate of recognition from the State of Connecticut, along with a proclamation from the Middlefield Board of Selectmen, a U.S. flag lapel pin, and a Middlefield key chain featuring the town seal presented by the Town of Middlefield.

Come with Curiosity, Leave with Perspective

On Saturday, October 18, from 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m., the Levi E. Coe Library in Middlefield will host a **Human Library** - a powerful and unique event designed to break down barriers, spark understanding, and foster meaningful conversations.

Why Attend? The Human Library is unlike any other reading experience. Instead of borrowing books, you “check out” people - real individuals who serve as “human books” by sharing their lived experiences. This creates an open space for dialogue, questions, and reflection. The goal is to challenge stereotypes, build empathy, and create connections across differences. Some of the titles available at our circulation desk will be: Growing up in Low Income Housing, Haitian Immigrant, After Incarceration, Caretaking for a Terminal Spouse, Autism Insight, and many more. Whether you’re curious about another person’s culture, profession, or life journey, the Human Library gives you the chance to learn directly from their perspective. It’s a safe, respectful environment where difficult questions are welcomed and mutual understanding is encouraged.

What to Expect: When you arrive, you’ll see a catalog of available “books” - community members who have volunteered to share their stories. You can select a book that interests you, then sit down for a 20 - 30-minute conversation. Every story is unique, and every exchange offers an opportunity to listen, ask questions, and gain new insight. The event is informal, welcoming, and designed for people of all ages. Whether you stay for one conversation or several, you’ll leave with a deeper appreciation for the richness of human experience.

What You'll Take Away: Participants consistently leave the Human Library with:

- A new perspective on experiences different from their own.
- A deeper sense of empathy and understanding.
- Connections with people they might never have met otherwise.
- The inspiration to carry openness and curiosity into everyday life.

Volunteer Opportunities

- Are you someone with a story to tell? The Human Library has room for a few more volunteers to serve as “books.” If you have a perspective, identity, or life experience that could help others better understand the world, consider stepping forward. Training and support will be provided.
- Would you like to serve as a ‘Librarian’? You will assist with the circulation desk, escort readers to their books, and/or help with set up and break down of the event.

Building relationships and making connections with others is paramount for our mental health. Groups like Paper House Productions, Girl Scouts, Scouts, Parks and Recreation, sport teams, senior community lunches, along with a multitude of other local groups create opportunities for our community members to thrive through these connections.

If you are involved in a community group, chances are you are increasing protective factors, and we want to know about it!

Tales from the Cemetery by Ken Twombly



Ken's final submission is a true gift to Middlefield. He didn't just preserve our history - he loved it, and made sure we could all share in that connection. His words reflect the heart he gave to this town, and his legacy will continue to inspire and connect generations. Ken passed on June 7, 2025.

Jedediah Colcord Safford was born in Morrisville, Vermont, on Feb 15, 1844. He was the son of Norman H. Safford and Hannah P. Quimby. His education consisted of that which was available to the youth of the time and locality. His father's health was poor, forcing Jedediah to shoulder many of the family burdens which he served well. His father passed on in 1862 and, shortly afterward, he was offered a position by Moses Terrill, a native of Morrisville, to come to Middlefield and work at the Metropolitan Washing Machine Factory of which Terrill was a partner with David Lyman.

The factory was located in Baileyville at the current site of the Blackbird Tavern. He went to New York state in 1864 to farm for a brief time with his brother-in-law, a position which he found less than satisfactory. He returned to Middlefield to his position at the Washing Machine Factory.

In 1870, Jedediah was appointed station master for the Middlefield station. In 1884, he transferred to the Rockfall station where he also had one half interest in a general store with the firm of Safford & Francis. On Sept 8, 1863, he married Eunice M. Metcalf with whom he had 3 daughters; Annetta, Mary, and Grace, all of whom are also buried in Middlefield Cemetery. He was a member of the Methodist church in which he held several prominent offices. Having been recognized for his trustworthiness, he was elected First Selectman, which he served for 4 years, and tax collector for 6 years. He then served in the State Legislature.



He made his home in Rockfall where he died on March 5, 1921. More information can be found in "Biography of Middlesex County, Large Volume".

Town Receives Rebate
